

WHAT IS AN ALLIGATOR GAR?

The gars Top speed was 40 mph.

A gar lives to be 50-70 years old.



MATING AND BABIES

The Gar usually breeds in wetland vegetation, murky ponds, or lakes because they need camouflage to breed so predators don't kill them. The Gar's eggs are very poisonous, which means the Gar doesn't want

their kind to die out. An average female gar lays 138,000.
