electricity, and was one of five men to draft the Declaration of Independence. As

Benjamin was getting much older and the government was beginning to fall apart. 55 delegates from 12 states came to Philadelphia for the Constitutional Convention to try and figure out the problems. At 81 years old Benjamin was the oldest at the Convention. Benjamin Franklin was 84 years old when he died, and he is still remembered for what he did to make our country the place is it today.

In the Independence Hall, you are able to be informed on the Constitution. If you ever go to it, you can get a real visual and idea of the history of the Constitution. Our tour guide informed us about the
