This clock shows the world's biggest example of Tiffany's glass. The sculptures around the clock are Hercules, Minerva, and Mercury. They are gods in Roman and Greek myths. In 1914, this trio was considered the largest sculptural group in the world. The clock is 13 feet wide and tall and the whole thing is 48 feet tall.
