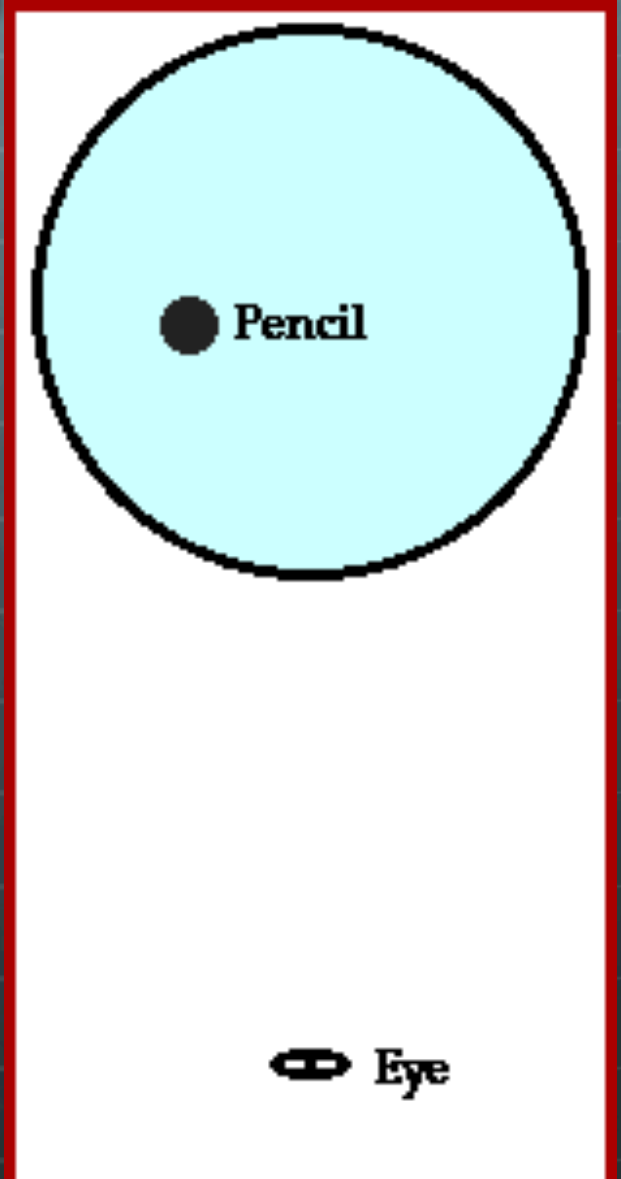

I'm very surprised that something as simple as water, can truly be so beautiful. I hope you greatly enjoy this photo essay about how beautiful H₂O can truly be.



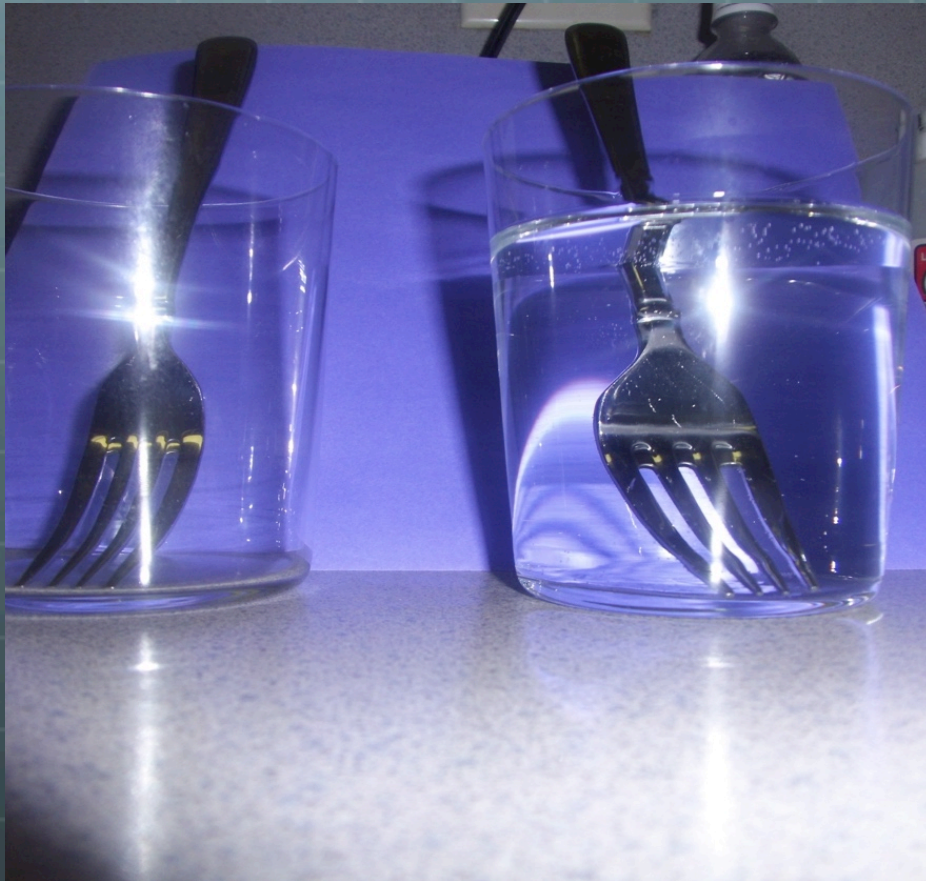
This is a boat, reflected on the water. It almost looks like the same exact boat is underneath its self, submerged in the water.

Two forks out of water.

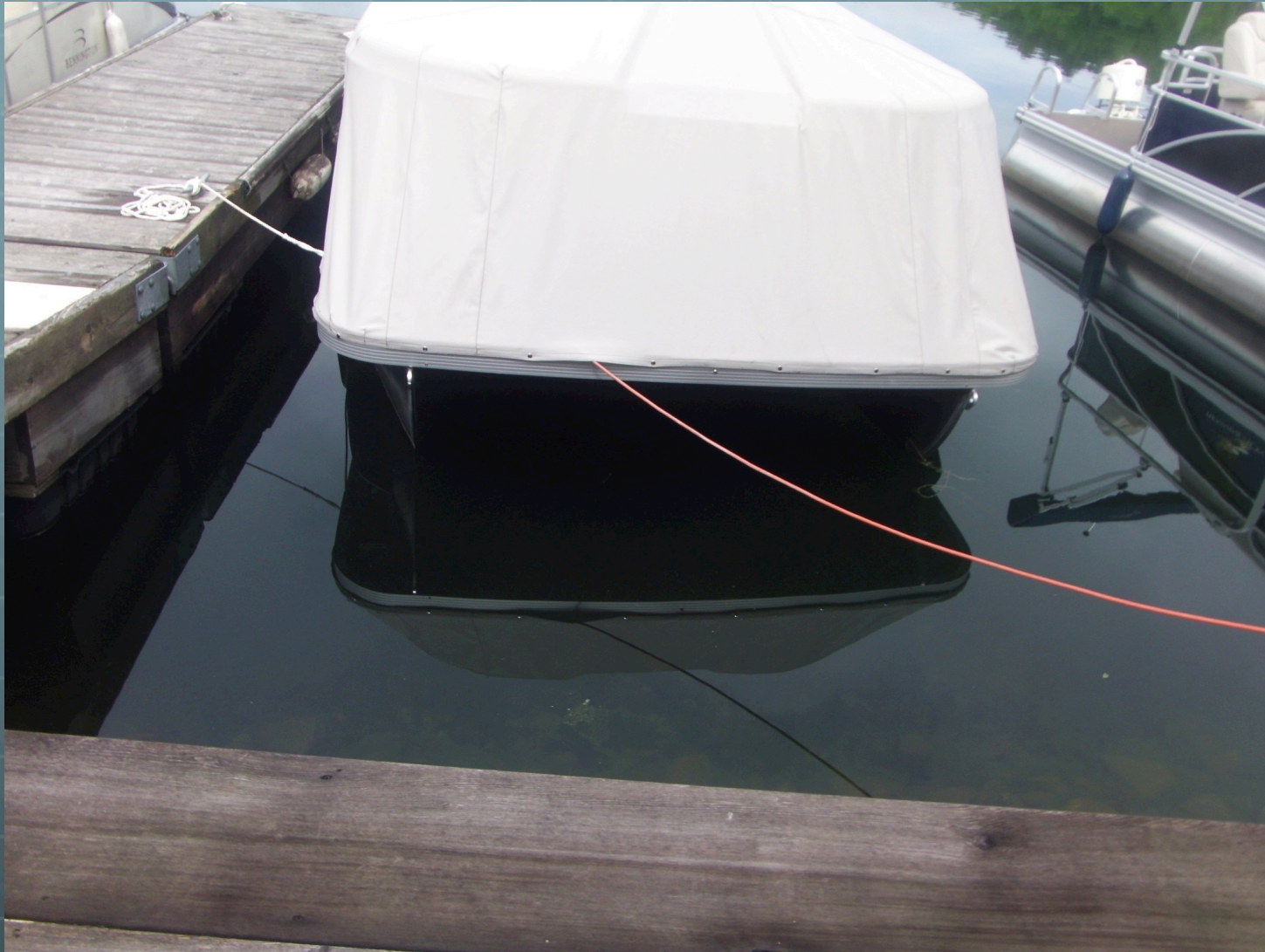
